By now, we typically would have been totaling up the results from our annual Fish Fry, but of course that has been cancelled because of the pandemic. However, I am pleased to report that our March general fund donations have been surprisingly strong. In addition, our utilities and other operating expenses have been down. The net result is that we broke even for the month of March. Go, Woodforest!

The One Great Hour of Sharing special collection, dedicated to disaster relief, is being collected through the end of April. If you would like to donate, please write OGHS in the memo line of your check and send it to the church.

FYI, I initially told some folks to mail their checks to my home address, but we now have a better system in place. Johnny Gaskill has been checking the church and its mailbox daily. He then drops any deposits in a drive-thru bank on his way home. Thanks a million, Johnny... you're the best!

And great news! Churches are definitely covered under the recent CARES Act, which is designed to help businesses keep the lights on and the employees paid for the estimated 2.5 months it will take us to shelter at home. In addition, the Board of Pensions is also offering

relief to its members, and the Presbytery is providing grants to offset Zoom expenses. I will keep you updated as these applications move forward.
